<u>From the Principal – Mr. Bob Morris</u>

The waiting is the hardest part...

I love lost kinds of live music. I've always appreciated seeing and hearing musical artists perform their work or the work of others. Third Day announced their farewell tour, and I knew that I had to see their final performance. Their final concert was at Red Rocks, not far from Denver. I ordered close seats, and we got to participate in a sound check and ask bands questions. One of the musicians was Matt Mayer and someone asked him who his favourite secular musician was, and he replied that he didn't listen to a lot of secular music but did like Tom Petty and the Heartbreakers. At that moment, I instantly liked Matt Mayer because of his response.

One of Tom Petty's hits had the line: "The waiting is the hardest part." We are entering the season of Advent, and it is a sacred season of waiting and anticipation which leads up to Christmas. I have devotions every morning with the grade five and six class. I have decided to read chapters from the Gospel instead of a devotional. We just started Luke, where we read about when the angel Gabriel appeared to Zechariah in the temple and announced that Zechariah's prayers were heard, and his wife will bear a son. The story goes on to tell that Elizabeth goes into seclusion during her pregnancy for five months. The angel Gabriel appears later to Mary and announces that she will give birth to the Son of God. Mary visits Elizabeth and stays with her for three months before returning home. Elizabeth gives birth to a son and names him John. We read in chapter two how Mary and Joseph had to travel from Nazareth to Bethlehem to be counted in the census. At this time, Mary is in her ninth month of pregnancy and Jesus is born. Luke chapters 1 and 2 describe many months of time, a lot of waiting...

From a worldly perspective, we can get caught up into the hustle and bustle of the Christmas season. We try to pack in so much, whether it is Christmas parties, family gatherings, Christmas performances, etc. Kids get caught up in the excitement and have a hard time focussing at school due to the excitement.

The word Advent comes from Latin *adventus*, meaning "coming," and reflects on the preparation of our hearts to celebrate the birth of our Saviour Jesus Christ and awaiting His promised return. Advent allows us to slow down, pause (or unplug) amidst the busyness of modern holiday preparations. Through prayer, scripture readings, acts of service, we are called to redirect our attention from material distractions to spiritual renewal. This season encourages us to emulate and model His example of showing love to others.

Advent shouldn't be a countdown to Christmas day but a time of transformation. It teaches us to embrace waiting, a reminder that God's promises are fulfilled in His perfect time. As we prepare to celebrate the birth of Jesus, Advent calls us to reflect on the hope He brings and the light He offers in the midst of life's challenges. By preparing our hearts during Advent, we can experience Christmas with deeper joy, meaning, and renewed sense of awe for the gift of God's Son.

PCS Policies Update – Cell Phone Use and Inclement Weather

Our Education Committee and Board updated two policies.

The first policy deals with student cell phones at school. The province created a new language and required schools to create new cell phone policies. We previously thought our policy was adequate but have learned that students were using cell phones in bathrooms and locker rooms. We know that many of our students already have cell phones. We know that some have been discouraged from bringing them to school with the new policy. If cell phones are brought to school, we are asking that the cell phones be turned off and given to the classroom teacher

for locked storage until the student is leaving school. Students will be allowed to contact parents via the school phone and parents are welcome to call the school and leave a message with Mrs. Slomp.

The other policy deals with inclement weather. Our previous policy stated that we will follow Wolf Creek School Division's policy. Wolf Creek has recently updated their inclement weather policy:

- Colder than -40 C: Buses cancelled; schools are open
- Colder than -45 C: Buses cancelled; schools closed
- Road conditions Heavy snowfall, blowing snow, freezing rain, heavy fog: busses cancelled, schools may be closed.

The PCS board has decided to continue to follow Wolf Creek School Division Policy. Please see the Wolf Creek S.D. website or Facebook page, or the PCS parent Facebook page if temps get low and you are unsure if school is open or not.
